January is Human Trafficking Awareness Month and it's crucial to raise awareness regarding severity of this issue. Human trafficking can often be a misunderstood topic filled with inaccurate myths. People tend to believe that human trafficking only involves sex trafficking but there is actually much more involved. Victims can be forced into sexual exploitation or forced labor. It is not always easy to recognize signs but we can educate ourselves on being able to see the hints of a potentially dangerous situation and spread awareness in hopes for fighting for a better justice system for victims. There are multiple ways to prevent human trafficking which are listed to the right of this article. "Human Trafficking is easily overlooked because it's hidden in plain sight. From sexual exploitation to forced labor, children, adults, woman and men are forced to commit favor, acts and labor against their will. It's our job as a community to come together, learn the signs and stand up to make the difference. Let's give them their voice back and the ability to say no, "said Waleska Guadalupe, Victim Advocate. Also be aware that the youth are a highly sought, targeted demographic. Pay attention to youth that might need extra help and support emotionally. This could potentially assist the youth in avoiding getting involved in a trafficking situation. Youth runaways are a particularly vulnerable population. Remember to also show support to the victims. You can help by donating goods to shelters which include canned food and/or clothing. You can also donate your time to help.

Ways to prevent human trafficking

- 1. Share a missing person(s) poster
- 2. Call the hotline if you believe someone is a victim
- 3. Help spread the Hotline
- 4. Volunteer at a non-profit to spread awareness
- 5. Donate to a trafficking prevention non-profit
- 6. Use social media to raise awareness
- 7. Host awareness events
- 8. Be aware of what companies you're supporting
- Boycott companies that permit human trafficking
- Stay educated and inform yourself of any signs
